Woman charged in 'heinous' murder of Pinson woman

A 25-year-old Birmingham woman has been charged with capital murder and robbery in the Friday killing of a Pinson woman in northern Birmingham.

Bianca Holman is in Jefferson County Jail with no bond on the murder charge and a \$150,000 bond on the robbery charge in the shooting death of 63-year-old beauty salon owner Chay ya Anders, of Pinson.

The Birmingham Police Department reported that Anders was found dead inside Ebony Beauty Supply in the 2900 block of 27th Street

Detectives believe Holman robbed the business and shot Anders. Detectives were able to connect the suspect to a robbery that occurred the day before at Jack's Food Store. Holman was identified by a witness as the person who robbed the store that Friday

afternoon. Detectives also learned from a witness that the suspect who matched the description in the earlier robbery was at the scene of the homicide Saturday.

A Trussville man is one of two people charged in a burglary that occurred Saturday morning.

Taylor Payton Kling, 31, of Trussville and Jamie Bruce Crawford, 45, of Center Point have been charged with burglary after being caught in

the act Saturday in the 1900 block of Spring Lake Court near Center Point.

A witness spotted the two men climbing onto the victim's roof in order to gain access to a window. This happened in broad daylight, according to the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office. The witness alerted police of a burglary in progress and Jefferson County sheriff's

deputies were waiting on the alleged bandits when they crawled out the same window they used to gain entry.

After climbing down from the roof, Kling and Crawford were taken into custody and charged with third-degree burglary and possession of burglary tools. Both men were found with women's jewelry and stolen cell phones on their person.

The 128-page book is available wherever books are sold, and also online at www.historypress.net



heinous crime where there was no regard for the victim or this community," Birmingham Police Chief A.C. Roper said. "I appreciate the detectives and the various enforcement units for their investigative intensity in this case. This was a casebook investigation where we went from absolutely nothing to an identified suspect in a matter of hours.

"Our criminal homicides have decreased significantly so far this year but we realize a single homicide is one too many for the affected family. We can't prevent every homicide but we have solved every case so far this year. The bottom line is if you commit a homicide in this city, we will never stop looking for you."

question, believes that despite the company representative's assurances, the warehouse could only lead to trouble down the road.

"I have nothing against someone expanding their business or what have you," Hogan said. "However, he says he's planning on doubling everything. Well, six employees goes to 12 to 15 employees. That's in a curve (on the highway). It's right next to the school. Traffic there is already atrocious and I just feel that this is not a good area for us to have this."

Two other property owners spoke against the rezoning, one claiming that the dry food products could attract rats to the area around the school.

Since the property is currently zoned for residential agriculture, Councilman Robbie Roberts believes the impact of a warehouse might

not be much different. Roberts said the impact of the warehouse might not be any worse than if a farmer were to put the legally allowed number of chickens, goats or cows on the property.

Despite the unanimous decision of the Planning Commission to deny the rezoning, Roberts believes that with the proper covenants in place -- legally binding agreements between the property owner and the city on what can and can't be done on the property -- the warehouse could be beneficial to everyone.

Thee covenants would extend to any future owners of the property as well. Violation of the covenants could lead to jail time.

Councilman John Churchwell made a motion to table the decision until all options had been investigated. The Pinson City Council next meets Thursday, April 17 at 6:30 p.m. at Pinson City Hall.


"There was no time when I believed Matt Pitt was a police officer," Lunsford states in the affidavit. "At no point did he act in a way to make me think he was a police officer."

Little, in a signed March 19 affidavit, states that, "Mr. Vessels said 'Matt Pitt! You're Matt Pitt? Oh I know who you are! I know what you do!' in a mad voice. From this point Mr. Vessels' whole attitude changed and he began talking to us in a very aggressive manner."

The Jefferson County case is currently awaiting a possible grand jury indictment.

Land being cleared for new Trussville Springs entrance

Land is being cleared in preparation for the construction of a new entrance to Trussville Springs, a community on U.S. Highway 11 in Trussville.

The new entrance will be located on U.S. Highway 11 approximately halfway between

Mohawk Drive and Maplewood Drive.

Trussville Springs spokesman Barry Stalnaker said the highway will be widened to accommodate turn lanes. He said several commercial building pads will be constructed, as will a new street to connect U.S. Highway 11 to Spring Street.

Stalnaker said the commercial areas of Trussville Springs will eventually be home to shops, restaurants and offices.

"We anticipate that the areas closest to the new entrance will be retail establishments," he said. Specific shops, restaurants and offices are not yet known.

Construction will require the relocation of several major utility lines and will include the installation of warning lights and gates at a new grade level crossing on the Norfolk Southern rail line, Stalnaker said. Paving operations will be coordinated to immediately follow the planned Alabama Department of Transportation repaying project for the existing highway lanes.

Completion of the new entrance is expected to take place by the end of summer, but that is "very tentative" because of complexities and the number of

entities involved, Stalnaker said.

Trussville City Clerk Lynn Porter said the clearing on the north side of U.S. Highway 11 is a "borrow pit," a place that can have dirt removed to be used where it's needed on the other side of the highway.

Callins will display his design and his other artwork at the SMART ART Festival on Satur-








